Scampton Church Community Partnership is awarded substantial grants by
The National Lottery Heritage Fund
& The FCC Communities Foundation to create the
Scampton Community & RAF War Graves Heritage Centre.

Scampton Church has received a grant of £150,923 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund and an FCC Communities Foundation grant of £99,090, for an exciting heritage and community project to create the Scampton Community & RAF War Graves Heritage Centre in Scampton village. The project is costing £343,000 and is made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the Landfill Communities Fund and also by public donations.

Working in partnership with RAF Scampton, The Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC), local schools, Scampton Parish Council, Springline Good Neighbours Scheme and The Dambusters Inn, the project aims to create a vibrant and welcoming venue that will benefit the whole community. This includes local schools and other organisations which cater for the young and old in the area.

The grants will enable the installation of a new lit path, all access wc, welcome and refreshment area, and central heating.

In addition, visitors will be able to explore the rich history and heritage of both the 14th century church and its 107 Commonwealth war and service graves to 'keep their stories alive'. Digital consoles will be installed to help tell the stories of those who made the ultimate sacrifice, and to teach the next generation of the Commonwealth War Grave Commissions (CWGC) work. Furthermore, the CWGC hopes to use the church building as a regional hub, where free talks for the public can be given and exhibitions can be displayed. The facility will also provide the much needed space for the community's Good Neighbours Scheme to provide local services for the elderly. It is hoped that the project will be fully completed by the Spring of 2023 and will become a new community asset following the closure of RAF Scampton.







Commenting on the awards;

We want to continue to work with the church and others to share the extraordinary stories of ordinary people remembered by us."

It is fantastic news that the Scampton Church Community Partnership has received such generous grants, which will enable important works to further strengthen the Church's role as a hub for the whole community. RAF Scampton has been part of that community for over a century, recognised through the RAF Chapel, the 107 military graves and, most recently, the installation of a new stained-glass window commemorating RAF Scampton. With our Station closing by the end of 2022, it is fantastic to know that its role within the wider community will continue to be recognised through the partnership's fantastic project.

Scampton Church is a member of a community partnership which includes: RAF Scampton, The Commonwealth War Graves Commission, Scampton Parish Council, Scampton and Pollyplatt Primary Schools, The Springline Good Neighbours Scheme and The Dambusters Inn.
