I feel truly blessed to have been able to assist in the creation of this stained glass window by sponsoring the RAF Scampton Badge panel and thereby help to commemorate all who served there in 1918 - 2018. I believe the window will be a beautiful and enduring tribute to them all. No doubt many found solace through the church, probably particularly so in times of war. For some, Scampton churchyard became their final resting place so their association is eternal.

My uncle, David Burrows George (1923 -1945), was killed in action flying with 153 squadron from RAF Scampton and lies in Venray War Cemetery in the Netherlands.

Researching my late husband's family tree revealed that his distant cousin, Harry Raynor Humphries (1915 - 2008), was adjutant of 617 Squadron, better known as The Dambusters.

I also discovered that another of my husband's cousins, Noel Denholm Davis (1875-1950), designed a stained glass window in honour of veterans who fought in the Crimea War and the Indian Mutiny for St. Mary's Church, Nottingham. These factors made it feel even more appropriate for me to support this magnificent and meaningful tribute.

I feel honoured and privileged to have had this opportunity to display everlasting respect in this way.



Bernard and Edith had close ties to both the village of Scampton and RAF Scampton where they were stationed in the 1960's, when the Vulcan was still operational.

Then, following Bernard's death, Edith returned to Scampton, to be loved and cared for by her daughter and son-in-law (John and Wendy Griffin) residents of Scampton Village since 1971.

Both of their sons also joined the armed forces: Buster in the Royal Navy and Michael in the RAF.

The Red Arrow was lovingly chosen by their family, a fitting tribute, as Edith's love and admiration for the Red Arrows was well known to all of her family and friends.

Bernard Stirk - 24.02.1925 – 10.10.2006 was born in Leeds and joined the Army in 1940, initially in the Parachute Regiment. However, when his Mother tracked him down and disclosed his true age, he was transferred to the REME. He served in North Africa and ended the war in Italy. Bernard was demobbed after the war, and joined the RAF in 1955, finally retiring as a Chief Technician in 1972.

Edith Stirk (nee Haigh), also born in Leeds 13.06.1924 – 06.03.2020, was one of four children, and sadly lost one of her brothers on HMS Glorious. Edith worked in the factories: sewing ammunition bags and fire-watching during the war.

Dedicated to 35 Squadron. The Cyprus Years Group. 1969 – 1971. In early 1969 the entire Squadron, equipped with Vulcan B2 aircraft and their families, were posted from RAF Cottesmore, Rutland to RAF Akrotiri, Cyprus and became part of the Near East Air Force. The men flew long sorties and were often away on detachment in Malta, Turkey, Iran and Masirah. Their wives, some of them away from home and families for the first time, supported each other.

There were beach clubs, theatre club, go cart club, various sports activities, Squadron and Station football teams. There were lively Squadron parties at No 2 Mess and the Berengaria Club. In the summer sometimes these parties included a fashion show with disco organised by the Squadron Wives Club. Sunlit days and velvet nights.

During this time together we became a special band of brothers and sisters. The Squadron wives who modelled in the fashion shows called themselves "The Hepburn Dollies" as Wing Commander Keith Hepburn was the Squadron boss during most of the tour and this became the name by which the group is known today.

There have been regular reunions through the years and in 2019 we celebrated being together as a group for 50 years, when over fifty of the group attended a three day reunion in the Cotswolds.

Window panels 69 and 155 are in dedication to our Grandmother, Eileen Mary Albone nee Strawson, 04/12/1916 – 12/03/2017, who served at RAF Scampton, as part of the WAAFs during WW2.

Eileen started with the WAAFs as an ambulance driver, due to her having some nursing training, a driving licence, and local knowledge of the roads without road signs.

She was then moved as a driver for the officer pilots to the Dambusters Squadron, and became the favourite of Guy Gibson. She told many stories

over her lifetime of how wonderful a person he was, how they would stop at one of her farming friends or family for a cup of tea and piece of cake, on their journeys around Lincolnshire. She drove Churchill and Barnes Wallis as part of the testing for the bouncing bomb and was sworn to secrecy.

She recalled that Guy addressed her as Strawson, and encouraged her to remove her cap when they were driving together, very informal for the times! Eileen was asked by Guy, on the night of the raids, to bury his dog, Nigger, at the same time as they were over the dams. Nigger had been a mascot of the Dambusters, and his death on the now A15 outside the base, was kept a secret from the men on the day of the raids, due to superstition of a poor result.

Eileen left the WAAFs to be married before the end of the war, and lived out the majority of her life at Cammeringham, spending many an hour watching the Red Arrows, with a cup of tea, biscuit and a Westie. She died aged 100, having been guest of honour at many RAF remembrance services. As my grandmother would have said, "It's always nice to dine out on a story." Carol Deague and Sara Albone

Panel 70

This script is cited in remembrance of Observer Jack Kelway, a member of No. 11, now No. 15 Group Royal Observer Corps, Lincoln. He also served as a member of Lincolnshire Special Constabulary before joining the Royal Observer Corps. Jack was tragically killed near Welton whilst carrying out his line of duty to report to his observer post at Hackthorn, when a German Ju. 88 aircraft crashed onto his car in the early hours of the morning on March 4th 1945. Jack was the only member of the Royal Observer Corps to be killed on duty on land and left behind a family, namely his wife Irene, and three children: Tony, Patrick and Christine.

Jack Kelway was buried at Newport Cemetery Lincoln, in a service attended by fellow members of his ROC post No. Love 1 and work colleagues from Bardney Sugar Beet factory.

The crew of the Ju. 88 also died at the scene and are buried here in the adjacent churchyard.

History of 35 Squadron from Thetford to Scampton 1916 to 1982

Pete's interest in 35 Squadron started in 2013 when his partner, Laura, wanted to find out about her grandfather, who had been killed during WWII. Initial research identified that he and his crew had served with 35 Squadron, losing their lives in Lancaster ME334 on 4th February 1945. Having "caught the research bug" and identifying that very little had been recorded about the history of 35 Squadron, he created a website, which now contains 1,500 pages of 35 Squadron history, the site which is dedicated to all who served with No. 35 Squadron (1916 – 1982) and to the memory of those that lost their lives whilst doing so, aims to preserve the history of No. 35 Squadron and to ensure that all who served with the squadron, from its earliest beginnings during World War I, through to its latest disbandment in 1982, are always remembered.

It contains a Year by Year History, along with information on squadron aircraft, airfields, personnel, operational duties, memorials, insignia and many other subjects.

35 Squadron The Cyprus Years Group 1969 to 1971 wish to acknowledge Pete's tremendous efforts in putting the history of 35 Squadron together, and his help in arranging the laying of a wreath in Chievre 2018, and a memorial stone in the Ribbon of Remembrance at the International Bomber Command Lincoln 2019. Douglas, his Father, joined the RAF aged 15 in 1948.


He worked on a variety of planes at bases in the UK with memorable postings to Singapore and Kenya with his family.

Jack was tragically killed near Welton whilst carrying out his line of duty to report to his observer post at Hackthorn when a German Ju. 88 aircraft crashed onto his car in the early hours of March 4th 1945. Jack was the only member of the Royal Observer Corps to be killed on duty on land during WWII.

The crew of the Ju. 88 also died at the scene and are buried here in the adjacent churchyard.

Dedicated to the memory of our cousin, Co-pilot 1st Lt Arthur L. Thomas, 573 Bomb Sqn, 391 Bomb Gp (USAAF) and his crew.

On August 25th, 1944, at around 4:20 pm, the USAAF 42-95802 T6-P 'Skeeter' Martin Marauder having successfully bombed coastal defences near Brest collided with B-26 42-95797 'TS Ticket'. Sensing that the little fuel left in the tanks would not be enough to get the aircraft back to USAAF Station AAF-166 (RAF Matching), Capt Thorn had decided to leave the formation and attempt to land in Cherbourg. He then changed his mind and collided with 'TS Ticket' as he was rejoining the formation, severely damaging both aircraft. The rear gunner managed to bail out of the second aircraft which made its way towards Jersey. Moments later, it was hit by flak, killing Sgt Shuler, the radio operator.

The 'TS Ticket' crew were rescued by US Navy destroyer, USS Borum, after their pilot miraculously managed to ditch the plane in the Channel. As 'Skeeter' plunged towards the sea, the airmen onboard were desperately trying to bail out through the front wheel well door which would not open. The navigator managed to bail out through the pilot's escape hatch and survived. He was able to help local fishermen recover the bodies of the pilot and co-pilot 1Lt Thomas. S/Sgt Meyer and S/Sgt Norland both died after having been taken to a clinic in Paimpol. The bodies of T/Sgt Annette and S/Sgt Evans were recovered several days later. The body of 1Lt Parks was the last to be recovered, on the Jersey shore.

Lt Calvert, the lone survivor, attended the funeral of Capt Thorn and 1Lt Thomas in Loguivy. He died in 1976, after having served in the Air Force during the Korean War. Capt Thorn, 1Lt Thomas, T/Sgt Annette and S/Sgt Meyer now permanently rest in Brittany American Cemetery. The bodies of their friends were repatriated to the US according to their families' wishes. The crew were used to flying together. They had flown close to sixty missions since February 1944 including bombing the Pointe-du-Hoc coastal defences, a few minutes before the D-Day landings.

In a letter to his parents written on the evening of June 6th, 1944, Captain Thorn wrote: "I'm feeling fine and I'm awfully glad that the beginning of the end has at last come. It's like dawn breaking after a long dark night".

Frank Hobson was born in Leeds, Yorkshire, on 8 October 1894. He originally served in the Royal Engineers, but transferred to the Royal Flying Corps, being commissioned a temporary second lieutenant (on probation) on 10 May 1917.

In September 1917, he was assigned to No. 65 Squadron RFC. Flying Sopwith Camel No. B2305. A summary of his record shows ten enemy aircraft destroyed and five driven down out of control. He was awarded the Military Cross on 4 March 1918 for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has destroyed several enemy aeroplanes and driven others down out of control.

On 25 March 1918, Hobson was removed from combat duty and assigned to No. 72 Training Squadron in the Home Establishment in England.

He ended his duty and left the service in February 1919. To old to fly in WW2 he served as a bomber command controller. He died in Leicester on 5 May 1951. Joe and Christine Bartrop

"I would like to dedicate my panel to the Aircrew and Ground crew of 1066 Flight, part of 230 OCU, who flew the Handley Page Hastings based at RAF Scampton from the early 1970's until its retirement from RAF Service in 1977. The Flight had four aircraft (TG 503 (which flew in the Berlin Airlift) TG505, TG 511 and TG517). The aircraft had been fitted with the H2S radar and their primary role was to teach young navigators, who were destined to fly the F4 Phantom and Buccaneer aircraft, navigation at low level using radar mapping techniques. The Flight had secondary roles including Air Transport, Oil Rig patrols, Search and Rescue and Maritime Reconnaissance. The Flight took part in the 1975/6 'Cod War' in support of the Royal Navy using their radar to monitor the movements of the Icelandic gunboats.

I would particularly like to remember the older members of the Flight who flew in WW2 (some serving on Lancasters and who subsequently, for a while, flew the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight Lancaster PA 474) such as Sqn Ldr 'Chalky' White, Sqn Ldr Ken 'Jacko' Jackson, Sqn Ldr 'Jumbo' Cowan, MEng Derek Butcher and MEng Ian Gibson".

Window panels 69 and 155 are in dedication to our Grandmother, Eileen Mary Albone nee Strawson, 04/12/1916 – 12/03/2017, who served at RAF Scampton, as part of the WAAFs during WW2.

Eileen started with the WAAFs as an ambulance driver, due to her having some nursing training, a driving licence, and local knowledge of the roads without road signs.

She was then moved as a driver for the officer pilots to the Dambusters Squadron, and became the favourite of Guy Gibson. She told many stories



over her lifetime of how wonderful a person he was, how they would stop at one of her farming friends or family for a cup of tea and piece of cake, on their journeys around Lincolnshire. She drove Churchill and Barnes Wallis as part of the testing for the bouncing bomb and was sworn to secrecy.

She recalled that Guy addressed her as Strawson, and encouraged her to remove her cap when they were driving together, very informal for the times! Eileen was asked by Guy, on the night of the raids, to bury his dog, Nigger, at the same time as they were over the dams. Nigger had been a mascot of the Dambusters, and his death on the now A15 outside the base, was kept a secret from the men on the day of the raids, due to superstition of a poor result.

Eileen left the WAAFs to be married before the end of the war, and lived out the majority of her life at Cammeringham, spending many an hour watching the Red Arrows, with a cup of tea, biscuit and a Westie. She died aged 100, having been guest of honour at many RAF remembrance services. As my grandmother would have said, "It's always nice to dine out on a story." Carol Deague and Sara Albone

In remembrance of my dad, Geoff Rice, an ordinary lad from Leicestershire with a fascination for flying. Dad joined the RAF in 1941 and was selected for pilot training. He qualified in early 1942, was commissioned and on completion of heavy bombing training was assigned to 57 squadron at RAF Scampton.

In March 1943 he was posted with his crew to the newly formed 617 squadron in preparation for a secret mission 'Operation Chastise' now known as the Dambusters. As one of the 19 crews that set out on May 16, 1943, dad's Lancaster AJ-H flying very low, hit the sea, and having lost the bomb returned to Scampton. He did not consider it his 'finest' hour but was subsequently awarded the DFC for a raid on the Dortmund Ems Canal.

In late December 1943, his plane was shot down over Belgium with the loss of all his crew. Somehow, he survived and was helped by a succession of amazing resistance members who protected him for nearly 5 months before he was caught and became a POW in Stalag Luft 111. He died in 1981 but never forgot the crew he lost or those brave civilians who shielded him while on the run. This lovely window panel is a memorial to them all, and to his son, my brother Peter who died in 2018. *Pam Quick*

It was a Catalina out of Castle Archdale which spotted the Bismarck in May 1941.

Granted leave in August 1941 Elsie and Bill were married and had a short honeymoon in Dublin. Elsie left the WAAF in 1943 to go home for the birth of their daughter Frances. Elsie and Bill enjoyed 62 years of happy marriage and lived to see grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Christmas 1944 saw young David enjoying a visit with his family and meeting his baby niece, Frances. Within a month David and the entire crew were killed in action having flown from Scampton in a 153 Squadron Lancaster.



John was born on 22nd January 1922 at 1 Howells Terrace, Heol Las, Glamorgan, Wales.

At 18 years old John signed up as a 2RC at RAF Cardington May 1940, then to 951 Squadron based in Bristol. This merged into 927 Squadron. John was attached to 11 (BC) Balloon Command, defending the Bristol Channel.

He attended ACRC (Air Crew Recruiting Centre), London in October 1942 to commence his air gunner training.

John's initial training (14 ITW) was in Bridlington, moving to 4 AGS. He attended No. 12 OTU at RAF Chipping Warden in 1943, we understand the training was on Wellington bombers.

Conversion (1660 HCU) took place at RAF Swinderby, the start of his last few months in Lincolnshire. He learned about using Manchester's and Lancaster's. Then to Dunholme Lodge to join 1485 Gunnery flight. He was part of 467 Squadron at RAF Waddington for three weeks.

On 28th July 1943, his final posting was 57 Squadron at RAF Scampton. John made six sorties, the final flight he and this crew never returned. First flight was 29th July 1943 on JA914, John as Tail End Charlie (Rear Gunner). Future flights he was Mid-Upper Gunner, all the same crew.

John's last flight was 17th Aug 1943, leaving RAF Scampton at 21:44. Target the V2 rocket factory at Peenemunde, Germany. Flew Lancaster ED989, DX-F, Frederick III. ORB states

"Missing, lost contact after take-off". Believed to have been in the 3rd wave of Lancaster's.

John was 21 years old; may we never forget him and all those who sacrificed their lives for our freedom.


