Plants of Remembrance c.30 min: After being introduced to the general symbolism of plants and flowers connected with remembrance, students will explore in more detail the plants found in Scampton Church churchyard – including the story of John Hannah, who had a new rose named after him in remembrance and the last specimens of which lived at Scampton Church until they died.	<ul> <li>Different plants and flowers have symbolism, some of which connects to death and remembrance</li> <li>Recognize some key species of plants in Scampton church yard</li> <li>Know the story of John Hannah</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>What plants would I find at Scampton Churchyard?</li> <li>Who plants them?
